Labor Market Information

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Introduction

The information contained in this publication was obtained through Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) surveys. This survey is a cooperative agreement between the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, and the Virgin Islands Department of Labors' (VIDOL), Division of Labor Statistics. Funds are provided through our cooperative agreement, which provide procedures and technical support for operating the program. The VIDOL Labor Statistics OES program collects the data. A representative sample of employers is selected from each state's (Territory considered state for this survey purpose) unemployment insurance files, stratified by area, industry, and employment size. The sample area for the Virgin Islands was district wide (St. Croix/St. Thomas/St. John).

The scope of the survey includes establishments in the North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) sectors.

The Virgin Islands data is solicited from approximately 244 employers in each semi-annual survey. The survey has an average response rate of 81.36%. No one individual business location is in the sample more than once every three years. State and Federal Government are surveyed once each year.

Employment is the estimate of total wage and salary employment in an occupation across the industries in which it is reported. The survey forms are industry specific. To reduce respondent burden, these forms contain between 50 and 250 occupations. The occupations on the form are selected based on the importance of the occupation within the industry. Thus, data for specific occupations are collected primarily from establishment within industries that are predominant employers of workers in these occupations. Each survey form is structured; however, there are unstructured pages at the end for the respondent to report information for those occupations that are not listed on the form.

Surveyed OES wages are straight- time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Base rate, cost of living allowances, guaranteed pay, hazardous duty pay, including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on- call pay are included. Exclusions are back pay, jury duty, overtime, severance, shift differentials, non-production bonuses, employer cost supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements.

Collection of wage data is done in 12 intervals. Employers report the number of employees in an occupation per each wage range.

The SOC consists of 820 detailed occupations, grouped into 449 broad occupations, 96 minor groups, and 22 major groups (23 with military). The OES program provides occupational employment and wage data at the major group and detailed occupational level. The BLS OES website <http://www.bls.gov/oes/> can provide more information on the coding system and will describe occupations by title and definitions. This publication does not contain all occupations in the Virgin Islands. Based on federal law and program rules, when few workers are reported, the data is required to be suppressed for that occupation if the data would reveal confidential employer information. Information is also suppressed if the resulting estimates have a low degree of confidence. The relative standard error (RSE) is a measure of reliability of a survey statistic. The smaller the percentage relative standard error is, the more precise the estimate. Information on RSE factors is available at <http://www.bls.gov/oes/> under Technical Notes.

Percentile and Averages

Wage information in this publication is presented in a variety of formats that present the full range of an occupation's wage pattern. The formats place the occupations wage into quartiles and measures of central tendency.

The following provides a short description of each:

- The 10th percentile wage is the wage statistically determined to be the point at which 10% of the employment was reported below this wage, and 90% of the employment was above this wage.
- The 25th percentile wage is the point at which 25% of the employment was below this wage, and 75% was above.
- The 50th percentile wage is the mid-point where 50% of the employment is above, and 50% is below. The 50th percentile is the "Median" wage.
- The 75th percentile wage is the wage point where 75% of the employment is below this wage and 25% of employment was above this wage.
- The 90th percentile wage is the wage point where 90% of the employment is below this wage and 10% of employment was above this wage.

The average (mean) wage is the estimated total wage for an occupation divided by its weighted employment. The average of the 1st third is the average wage of the lowest third of reported wages for the occupation. The average upper 2/3rd is the average wage of the upper two thirds (67%) reported wages for the occupation.

This survey does not specify or differentiate between experienced or entry level employees, however, for many occupations the 10th or 25th percentile, or the average 1st third may be appropriate for an entry wage. Depending on the occupation, the 50th, or 75th or 90th percentile or the average of the upper 2/3rd may be appropriate for an experienced wage.

~Methods to Adjust a Current Wage


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- An hourly wage can be calculated from an annual figure for most occupations by dividing by 2,080, the number of hours in a year if you work 40 hours per week for 52 weeks. There are small number o f occupations where only an annual wage is provided. The workers in these occupations are paid based on an annual amount, but generally work less than 2,080 hours per year.
- The survey did not collect actual hours worked and so an hourly rate could not be calculated with a reasonable degree of confidence from the annual wages. In this case, only the annual salary is reported for these occupations. Wage information for part time workers was collected by hourly wage range.
- The wage estimates provided in this reference are based on second quarter 2009 wages and, therefore, probably do not accurately reflect a “current” wage. Several methods can be used to estimate changes in wages from a 2009 level to a more current level. One is to find data or statistics on new levels or the percentage of increase most new contracts have changed by and adjust the estimate for the respective occupation.
- Another method is to use an index such as a Consumer Price Index. This method assumes that, if the cost of goods increase over a period of time, if you adjust wages by the increment, you will be adjusting for the inflationary factor, and wages will keep pace with increases in consumer prices.
- Since local economies experience differing pressures to increase wages over time, or based on public policy and dichotomies within a jurisdiction, local wage conditions may vary by occupation and it is best to review local periodicals and job listings of current wages that can help to provide a local picture of current wages.

Occupational Wage Summary

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Wages for all occupations throughout the Virgin Islands averaged around \$16.85 per hour and \$35k on an annual basis, as of May 2009. This rate was up 4.72% from the previous rate of \$16.09 for the May 2008 data set. This slight \$0.65 growth is a result of private sector cost of living increases and some changes in wages in the overall sample due to job title changes in the data sets and changes in hours of production.



In the middle of the road (median), occupational wages were \$13.69 per annum.

At the 10th percentile (10% of employment was reported below this wage) range, wages per hour were \$7.84, slightly above the minimum wage, and the 25th percentile rates were \$9.65(although the survey does not specify or differentiate between experienced or entry level employee, however, for many occupations the 10th or 25th percentile may be appropriate for entry level wage). The 50th percentile (is the mid-point where 50% of the employment is above and 50% is below) rates were \$13.69 with an annual salary range of \$28,480.The 75th percentile (the wage point where 75% of the employment is below this wage and 25% of employment was above this wage) rates were \$20.75 with the annual salary range at \$43,160.The 90th percentile (considered senior positions and experienced positions, and where 90% of the employment is below this wage and 10% of employment was above this wage.) wage rates for overall occupations were \$29.37 and \$61,090 on an annual basis.

Comparison of National & Virgin Islands Wages

Occupations annual averages are paying (23.9%) less in the Virgin Islands compared to National salaries (see table below). In the middle of the road (median) wages are 16.5% higher on a National level, and the average wages in occupations are \$4.05 lower for 2009.
