**SUBJECT:** Workers' Compensation Classification, Rates and Implementation of Act 8859

We are pleased to announce the release of the Sixth Edition of the "Manual of Classifications and Basic Rates," including updated information on Workers' Compensation Insurance laws. The new Code Numbers, Classifications, and Basic Rates took effect on **January 1, 2024**.

Act 8859, signed into law on August 9, 2024, transitions the Government Insurance Fund from the Department of Finance to the Virgin Islands Department of Labor (VIDOL), renaming it the **Workers' Compensation Trust Fund**. This move is designed to streamline the process for employees injured or who fall ill due to work, improving access to benefits.

#### Under Act 8859:

- **Staff Transition**: Employees who previously administered the Government Insurance Fund will now form the Underwriting Unit within VIDOL's Workers' Compensation Administration, with offices in both districts. This will enhance the speed and accuracy of claims processing.
- **Trust Fund Purpose**: The Workers' Compensation Trust Fund will continue to provide financial and medical support for injured employees and assist employers in maintaining safer workplaces.

New Deadline for Employer Premium Payments: All employers must pay their annual workers' compensation premiums by December 31, 2024. Employers may also opt for a semi-annual payment plan, with each installment covering six months. Starting October 21, 2024, all payments should be made at VIDOL offices in St. Thomas or St. Croix. Act 8859 provides additional payment details.

### MINIMUM PREMIUM CHARGED

NO PREMIUM AMOUNT SHALL BE LESS THAN FIFTY DOLLARS (\$ 50.00) PER CLASSIFICATION.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS PURSUANT TO TITLE 24 CHAPTER 11 OF THE VIRGIN ISLANDS CODE

Every employer affected by this chapter shall file, with the Commissioner of Labor, of each year, on forms supplied by the Commissioner of Labor, an **ACTUAL REPORT** (NOT required for new business) for the previous year and an **ESTIMATED REPORT** for the current year, showing the number of workers employed, the kind of occupation or industry, the total amount of wages paid and amount of premium payable. The premium shall be computed and paid on the first \$ 8,424.00 of each workers' wages for each year.

Premium payment must accompany these reports. However, an employer may request to pay annual premiums in two instalments, provided that the Estimated Premium due is \$ 2,500.00 or more and required reports are filed in accordance with section 273.

Any employer who wilfully misrepresents the amount of payroll upon which premium is based shall be liable for a fine five (5) times the amount of the difference between the premium which should have been paid. Failure to report and pay premiums due within the time required by law, may result in: (1) fines not more than \$5000.00 or imprisoned not more than six (6) months or both, in addition to being an **UNISURED EMPLOYER** liable for a law suit by an injured worker or beneficiaries; (2) levies against your bank account(s), receivables and any other income; or, (3) seizures of any property or rights to property, owned by you.

The physical location of your business or offices must be indicated, a telephone number where you may be contacted, along with your email address is also required.

### **PURPOSE**

The primary purpose of "The Workers Compensation Trust Fund" is to provide insurance protection for working men and women throughout the Virgin Islands in the event of work-related accidents, under which they are entitled to medical rehabilitation, along with restoration of a portion of wages lost as a result of disability and vocational rehabilitation where necessary.

### WHO IS COVERED

All persons who work for wages, including minors who are employed by appointment or under an expressed or implied contract, written or oral, except (a) any person employed as a domestic servant in a private home. (b) any person employed, for not exceeding ten consecutive work days, to do maintenance, repair, remodeling, or similar work in or about the private home of the employer, or, if the employer has no other employees subject to this act in or about the premises where such employer carries on his trade, business or profession. (c) any person performing services in the return for aid or sustenance only, received from any religious or charitable organization. (d) any person for whom a rule of liability for injury or death is provided by the laws of the united states.

### **OPTIONAL COVERAGE**

By agreement between an employer and employee, and under regulations prescribed by the Commissioner of Labor, employees who are exempt from the provision of the law may be provided coverage.

### **PERIOD OF COVERAGE**

The insurance of each employer shall be enforced immediately after his statement has been filed with the Commissioner of Labor, and paid the amount of the premium corresponding to the wages declared in said statement and in accordance with the rates fixed by the Commissioner of Labor. In the event an accident

occurs before the payment of said premium is made, it shall be considered as a case of an uninsured employer, unless the employer pays within the term fixed by the Commissioner of Labor.

The annual premium must be paid in full by December 31<sup>st</sup>, or in two installments. If the installment option is chosen, the first installment is payable on or before December 31<sup>st</sup>, consisting of not less than one-half of the annual premium, plus any additional premium due, for which a 6-month policy will issue, and the second installment must be paid on or before June 30<sup>th</sup>, for which a policy will issue for the remaining six months effective until December 31. The actual number of employees a company has employed must be reported to the Workers Compensation Administration not later than September 30<sup>th</sup> of the current year. The Workers Compensation Administration shall issue rates and notices to the employer no later than November 15<sup>th</sup>, and insurance policy renewals must begin on January 1<sup>st</sup> of the following year.

Every employer who has not filed the required reports and paid the premium due to which this section refers within the term fixed, shall be considered an uninsured employer.

### **UNINSURED EMPLOYER**

In the case of an injury to an employee, who was injured while working for an uninsured employer, the Commissioner shall determine the proper compensation plus the expense in the case, and shall collect from the employer, to be covered into the Uninsured Employer Cases Fund hereinafter created. Such compensation and expenses, that the Commissioner provided, shall include a penalty equivalent to 30 % of the compensation and expenses. In no case shall such penalty be less than \$10.00.

### **REPORTS BY EMPLOYERS: PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS**

- (a) Every employer affected by this chapter shall file for Workers Compensation Insurance Coverage with the Commissioner of Labor, the "ESTIMATED REPORT TO THE COMMISSIONER OF LABOR" (for NEW Employers only) and paying the required premiums.
- (b) Any employer who was insured as of December 31<sup>st</sup> of the previous year, must provide the "ACTUAL REPORT TO THE COMMISSIONER OF LABOR" for the nine (9) months ending September 30<sup>th</sup> by **September 30<sup>th</sup>** for the current year and the "ESTIMATE REPORT TO THE COMMISSIONER OF LABOR" for the coming year, showing the number of workmen employed by said employer, the kind of occupation or industry of workmen, the total amount of wages paid and to be paid and the amount of premium payable. **Payment due by December 31<sup>st</sup>** of the current year for a six (6) month policy
  - a. Final computations of premiums due (if any) and application of an experience rating will be applied once the submission of the employer's stamped copy of their fourth quarter (4<sup>th</sup> qtr.) VIESA filed with the Department of Labor is received. Once final computations are made a bill will be issued requesting payment by June 30<sup>th</sup> for the second (2<sup>nd</sup>) six-month policy.
- (c) The premium prescribed by this chapter shall be computed and paid on the first \$8,424.00 of each worker's wages for each year.

### **PREMIUM RATES**

Except as otherwise provided in the manual, a rate is a unit of the premium for each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of payroll. The coverage provided through payment of this premium rate will insure the employer against other liability for recovery of damages or other compensation for personal injuries.

### **HOW ASSIGNED**

The premium rates and classifications are assigned by the custodian of the Workers Compensation Trust Fund who evaluates the hazards of the individual business and then assigns the applicable industry classification.

### **HOW COMPUTED**

The amount of premium to be paid is determined by multiplying the "total payroll" by the "premium rate" assigned.

The premium payment of \$ 84, 240.00 total salaries paid (not exceeding \$ 8, 424.00 per year for any employee or employer) is therefore \$ 2,653.55.

A check, money order or credit card for the total premium amount must accompany the report. However, an employer may request to pay the annual premium in two (2) installments, provided that the Estimated premium due is \$ 2, 500.00 or more and required reports are filed in accordance with section 273(2).

### **INSTRUCTIONS**

### INFORMATION CONCERNING EMPLOYEES

In indicating the "Classification of Employee" use the description given in the premium schedules which have been issued. If not applicable, describe in your own words on the blank lines.

### **REPORT ON HAZARDS**

In the event any employee or group of employees is engaged in work involving any unusual or special hazards, list the employees or group separately and describe the work involved briefly but in sufficiently detail to give a clear picture of the hazard.

### **INJURY EXPERIENCE IN YOUR BUSINESS**

If any employee of yours has suffered, while in the performance of his duty, during the past three years, an injury which incapacitated him from work for a period of one day or more, attached a signed sheet giving a brief explanation of the nature, cause and extent of such injury or injuries.

### **SECURING OF COVERAGE**

With the submission of documents and payment being made, a Policy Number will be issued. A Certificate of Insurance and /or a bill if additional premium is required, will be mailed to you.

The physical location of your business, mailing address, along with an email address must be indicated on the forms. A telephone number where you may be contacted is also required. It is mandatory that the reports are signed.

Make all checks for Worker's Compensation insurance Premium payable to: **Workers Compensation Trust Fund** 

Outstanding balances shall bear interest at the rate of one per cent (1%) per month or any fraction thereof, from the due date until payment is received by the Workers Compensation Trust Fund.

### Changes/ additions as of 1/1/2024

### Cannabis/ Marijuana sales

All employees involved in the retail activity of selling, dispensing, and delivering marijuana to customers inside the retail store. To also include the cultivation and harvesting.

• As of this rating (12/30/2023), 41 states as well as the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico have approved the use of medical marijuana and there are 19 states that have legalized recreational use. As expected, insurance companies including workers compensation providers are still navigating through the assignment of general liability rate structures and workers compensation classifications attributable to cannabis sales and cultivation. Due to the lack of insuring experience, those companies that are writing policies are reluctant to share their rates and loss experience in this field. The cannabis category does not yet have a Classification Code assigned to it by the NCCI (National Council on Compensation Insurance- a nonprofit organization that annually collects more than 4 million workers compensation claims and 2 million policies. It also governs the details of how workers compensation insurance premiums are calculated) adding to this challenge.
